



painted on walls are older than history itself, tracing back through the famed prehistoric cave paintings in Lascaux, France and Altamira, Spain (15,000–10,000 BC) to 27,000 year-old stencilled hands found in an underwater cave near Marseilles. While today we tend to think of murals as a novelty or an exotic branch of what we consider the main trunk of two-dimensional art (works on canvas or paper), the fact is that people have always made art around themselves, on the walls and floors of the places where they lived or where they went for special ceremonial occasions. A continuous line of painted, ceramic and mosaic murals can be traced through time from the earliest cave paintings to the present day.

In the Southwest, wall paintings have been found in the ruins of Anasazi kivas dating back 1,000 years. Tucson's mural history goes back to the town's very beginnings, to the frescoes inside Mission San Xavier del Bac created in the 1790s by an unknown artist and recently restored to their full baroque glory.

Tucson's modern mural tradition dates to the 1950s and 1960s when several banks commissioned interior murals, both painted and mosaic, which featured images from the history of Tucson and Arizona. Our largest mural was begun during this period when Farmer John Meats hired Leslie Grimes, previously a wrestler in his native Australia and then a scene painter in Hollywood, to paint ranch scenes on the walls of its plant.

The 1970s marked the beginning of community murals done by people who lived and/or worked near the sites. In the Southwest and Southern California "El Movimiento" was characterized by "People's Murals". The Chicano artists who worked on them were strongly influenced by




"Los Tres Grandes" of the Mexican mural movement— José Clemente Orozco, Diego Rivera, David Alfaro Siqueiros. Their works depicted the history of their land and the social and political struggles of their people.

Here in Tucson Antonio Pazos and David Tineo painted the first of many murals rich in Mexican and Mexican-American images on the walls of El Rio Neighborhood Center in celebration of that community's success in getting its center built. Since then artists have worked with people in other areas of town, have listened to their ideas, and have created community murals in at least five neighborhood centers, incorporating imagery from some of the numerous other cultures of the Old Pueblo: Yaqui, Tohono O'Odham, African-American and more.



El Río Neighborhood Center David Tineo, *El Libro y La Esperanza de Nuestra Raza, 1976* (detail)


The 1980s brought dozens of new murals to Tucson. Financial support came from the City of Tucson, Pima County, community service agencies and private businesses. The schools discovered the value of having their students involved in mural work and sought funds for such projects. The Artist-in-Residence program of the Arizona Commission for the Arts created opportunities for artists to go to the schools and work with students to create murals on playground walls, on ramadas, and inside buildings, PTAs also sponsored murals, Tucson now has a hidden treasure of at least 66 murals scattered in more than 40 schools, familiar to generations of school children but largely unknown to others. Two artists in particular have contributed to this flowering: the muralist, David Tineo, and the painter, Alfred Quiroz, Tineo encourages young people to learn about their Mexican-American heritage and reflect on the benefits of education.





Alfred Quiroz, Untitled (detail)


Quiroz stimulates the children's lively imaginations to produce fanciful, whimsical murals full of bold, bright colors. After-school and summer programs at neighborhood centers and public housing units enable the youth from these areas to beautify their environments and express their dreams and discontents. Through the mural process they learn more than art. They learn math and history; how to make a plan and carry out that plan; and how to cooperate with each other. They gain a sense of self-worth and of individual and community pride.


